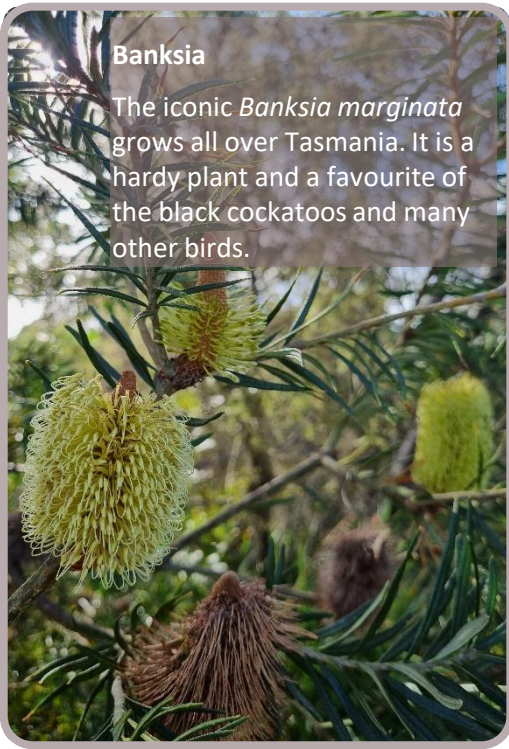




About the Snug River Walk

This gentle walk meanders through a rehabilitated forest along the Snug river. Many hands have worked to restore this beautiful place. Walking from the highway down, forest opens into estuary where a saltmarsh hosts a variety of shore birds and other plant and animal life.

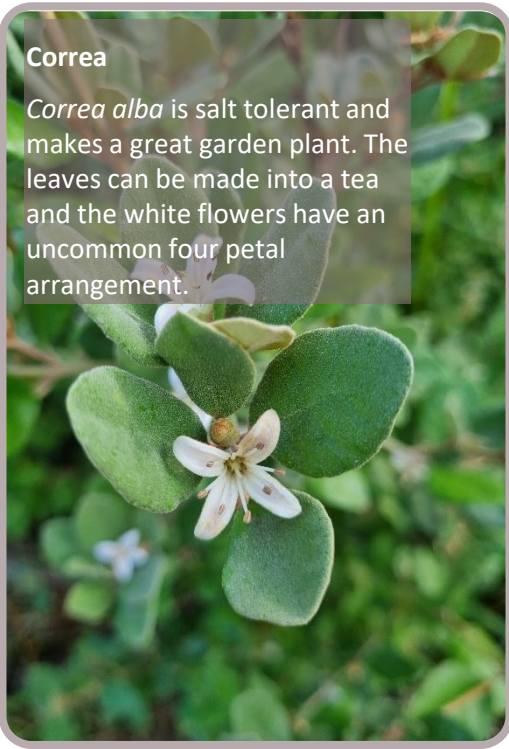
Here the river widens and flows under large trees before reaching the beach.



Banksia

The iconic *Banksia marginata* grows all over Tasmania. It is a hardy plant and a favourite of the black cockatoos and many other birds.

Correa

Correa alba is salt tolerant and makes a great garden plant. The leaves can be made into a tea and the white flowers have an uncommon four petal arrangement.

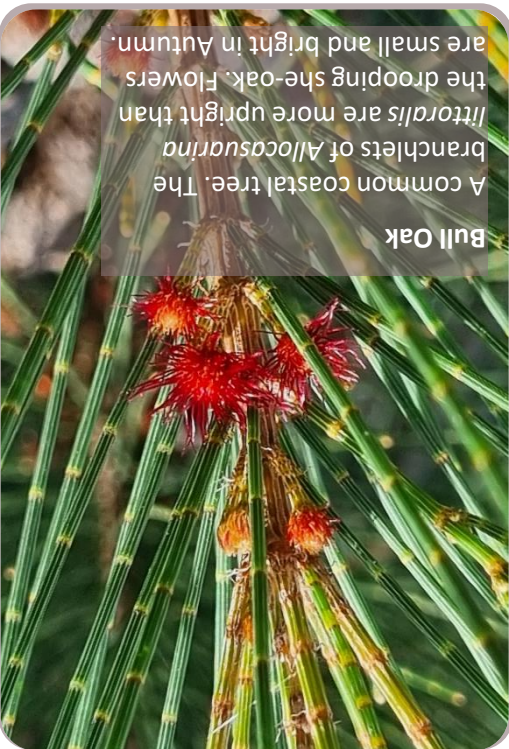


FOLD 1



Flax lily

Dianella is an understory plant with blue flowers in spring and berries in autumn. It is a hardy garden plant that sends out runners to self-propagate.



Bull Oak

A common coastal tree. The branchlets of *Allocasuarina littoralis* are more upright than the drooping she-oak. Flowers are small and bright in Autumn.



Sagg

A common tussock plant, the *Lomandra longifolia* provides habitat for small animals. You can easily identify it by its forked leaves.



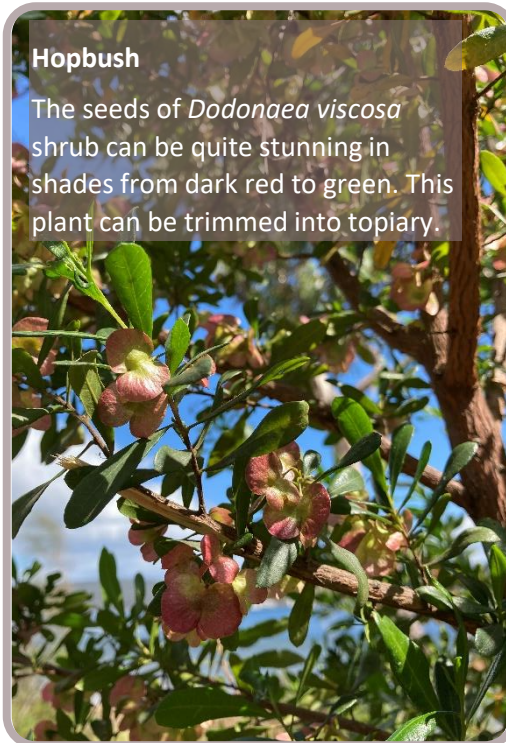
Tea tree

Leptospermum scoparium is a common coastal shrub with white flowers. The distinctive capsules can help to identify it as a member of the same family as the *Eucalyptus*.



Pale fruit Native Cherry

Exocarpus strictus is a very similar species to the native cherry but generally grows as a bush in dry areas.



Hopbush

The seeds of *Dodonaea viscosa* shrub can be quite stunning in shades from dark red to green. This plant can be trimmed into topiary.

Exocarpus is a common tree in coastal areas with abundant edible fruit in summer.

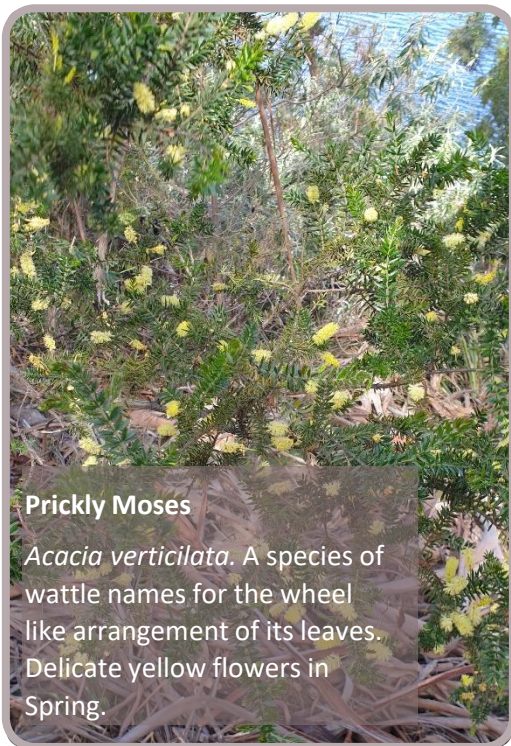

Prickly Moses

Acacia verticilata. A species of wattle names for the wheel like arrangement of its leaves. Delicate yellow flowers in Spring.



Habitat

Tasmanian wildlife are mainly crepuscular – meaning they are active at dawn and dusk. It can be hard to spot them. However, their tracks, scats and signs are everywhere if you look closely.



Saltmarsh

These important wetlands sequest carbon, clean water, protect the coast from erosion and provide critical habitat for many plants, animals and insects. The glassworts, *Sarcocornia quinqueflora*, can turn a brilliant red in winter.
