

### About the Kettering Point track

The gentle walk meanders close to the shoreline through the lightly wooded coastal bushland. A variety of birds, orchids and wildflowers can be seen along the track as well as panoramic views of the D'Entrecasteaux Channel and Bruny Island.


The Kettering Coastcare Group cleared away weeds to create this track with a new section now connecting Kettering Point to Trial Bay.




### She Oak

The green stems of *Allocasuarina verticillata* make a wonderful sound in the wind and have a lemon taste when crushed in the mouth.



### Pinkbells

*Tetralochea pilosa* also flowers in Spring and is sometimes called 'Black eyed Susan'. This plant always has four petals.



### Pretty Heath

*Epacris virgata* var *Kettering* is a pretty threatened species only found in the local area.




### Fungi

Autumn is the best time to spot fungi. A hand mirror is a good way to photograph top and bottom together!



### Current bush

*Leptomeria drupacea*, a very similar species to the native cherry generally only noticed while it flowers with a honey like smell.



### Parrot Pea

*Dillwynia sericea* is a very showy small shrub at the end of spring and into summer.

### Blue love Creeper

*Comosperma volubile* flowers in spring with a flash of blue. The plant climbs into shrubs and trees and is almost invisible when not in flower.



### Sundew

*Drosera*. This plant is insectivorous and traps small insects in sticky liquid (dew). Delicate pink flowers in Spring.

### Prickly Moses

*Acacia verticillata*. A great habitat choice for small birds who use the prickles for protection. Delicate yellow flowers in Spring.



### Riceflower

Several species of *Pimelea* grow along the track, a show of cream/pink flowers in spring.



### Habitat

Our native wildlife is mainly crepuscular – they are active at dawn and dusk. It can be hard to spot them. However, their tracks, scats and signs are everywhere if you look closely
