Kingborough Council has supported Tasmanian artists by acquiring artworks to help build a diverse collection for our community to enjoy. Each piece has been carefully selected to showcase creativity and enrich our public spaces.

Our ongoing collaboration with Art Farm Birchs Bay brings new energy each year to the collection. The annual sculpture exhibition enables the acquisition of a prize-winning sculpture to join the trail and offer new artists the opportunity to exhibit their work permanently in the public realm.

Our mural projects give young people the chance to assist established urban artists in the delivery of a new public art mural.

Whether you are on foot enjoying the walking tour in Kingston or exploring the wider driveable route from Tarooma to Bruny Island, we hope you enjoy viewing the sculptures and murals and appreciate their contribution to our beautiful municipality.

Visitor Tips

Plan your route: The trail includes a walking tour in Kingston (connecting Kingston Wetlands, Kingston Park, Denison Street Reserve and the Civic Centre) as well as the larger scenic drive stretching from Tarooma to Bruny Island. Choose your adventure—walk, drive, or mix both!

Look for signage: Information plaques provide insights into each artwork, materials used, and the artists who created them.

Pack for the day: Bring comfortable shoes, water, and a camera to capture your favourite pieces. You can hashtag #KINSculptureTrail or tag @KingboroughTas on Instagram to share your experiences.

Respect the art: Please enjoy the sculptures from a safe distance and help us look after them for all to enjoy.

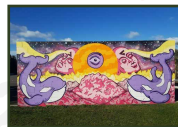

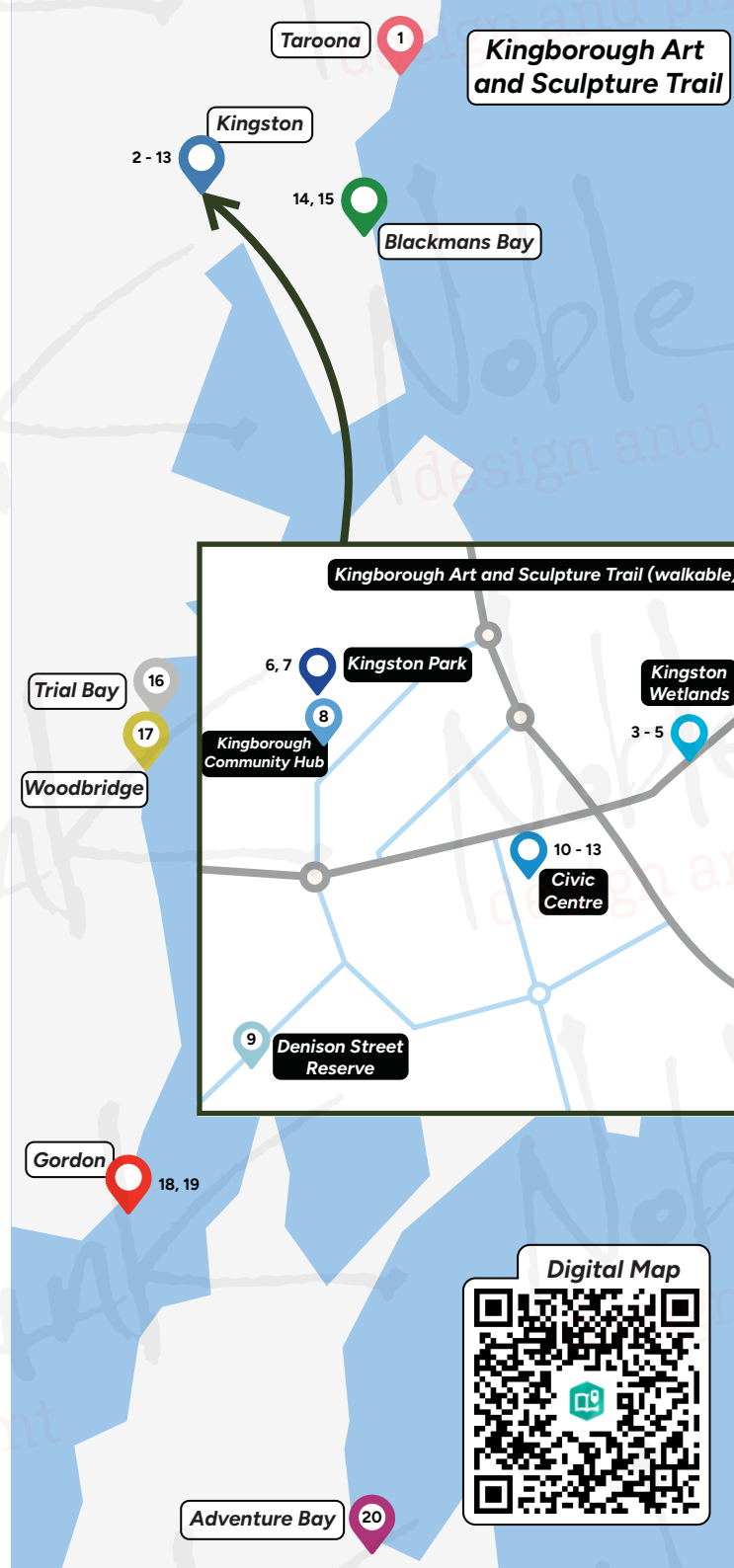

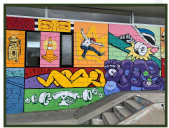
